Literary Theory refers to the corpus of ideas that help in reading and analysing the works of literature. The theories are the tools that help locate a text in a culture and an era, by means of which readers engage with questions like what is literature, why is it written, what is it's function and how does it contribute towards building the culture. These philosophical, sociological and psychological perspectives help interpret ideas within a text, provide a rationale for those ideas, besides helping in structuring those ideas. The course introduces a few of these important perspectives to help engage with a text through the means of selected readings.
